TMA's Marianna Pegno Receives National Art Education Award

TUCSON, ARIZONA (March 23, 2018) – Marianna Pegno, Curator of Community Engagement at the Tucson Museum of Art and Historic Block, has received the prestigious 2018 Elliot Eisner Doctoral Research Award in Art Education from the National Art Education Association.

The award, which is determined through a peer review of nominations, recognizes the value of doctoral research to the profession of art education and its related disciplines.

"This award is being given to recognize excellence in professional accomplishment and service by a dedicated art educator," said NAEA President Kim Huyler Defibaugh. "Marianna Pegno exemplifies the highly qualified art educators active in education today: leaders, teachers, students, scholars, and advocates who give their best to their students and the profession."

Pegno has been with the Tucson Museum of Art since 2010, holding various positions related to art education, creating programs and curating exhibits to increase interaction between the community and the museum.

She has presented at national and international conferences including the National Art Education Association, the Inclusive Museum, the Western Museum Association, and Arts in Society, and has been published in a number of museum publications and journals. She holds a Ph.D. in art and visual culture education from the University of Arizona, and master's and bachelor's degrees in art history from the University of Arizona and New York University, respectively.

"It's an honor to be recognized for the work that is a passion for me," Pegno said. "The Tucson Museum of Art is such a unique space to explore community, creativity and the arts that I want

to do everything I can to develop programs, engage audiences and position TMA as a responsive community-centered space.”
