Monarch Butterfly

Every year starting in late October and into November, the monarch butterfly migrates or moves from the United States and Canada to Mexico. Monarch butterflies play a role in Día de los Muertos because they are believed to hold the spirits of the departed. This belief stems from the fact that the first monarchs arrive in Mexico for the winter each fall on November 1, which coincides with Día de los Muertos.
