Artist and CAS Board Member Carrie Seid welcomed members to her home and studio in February. Carrie described the evolution of her artistic practice over the years, and graciously agreed to both discount the price of her works and to contribute to CAS a share of the proceeds of sales. The recent Lunar New Year provided the theme for the buffet.

The two groups fortunate enough to travel to Mexico City were treated to a dazzling array of art and food. I was part of the first group, which was able to visit the ZonaMaco Contemporary Art Fair, the largest in Latin America. BLUE LOTUS ARTISTS' COLLECTIVE (BLAC) SUNDAY, MARCH 24, 2024, 3:30 - 5:30 pm

Blue Lotus Artists' Collective (BLAC) is a non-profit gallery space dedicated to supporting and uplifting Black artists. Located on the ground floor of the historic Pioneer Building in downtown Tucson, the gallery is a place where the community can come together to celebrate, appreciate, and see the art and talent of Black artists.

The gallery was founded in 2022 after several meetings of Tucson artists and arts advocates to ascertain how to promote Black artists who are often underrepresented in museum and gallery settings. A smaller group, who now comprise the board members of BLAC, were determined to address the issue first hand by creating the artists' collective. Willie Bonner, local artist, chose the Blue Lotus to represent the effort.

The Blue Lotus is a water lily native to Africa, that grows even in muddy and nutritionally poor conditions, and was cultivated by the ancient, Egyptian civilization having great importance in their religious devotions.

Like the Blue Lotus, Black artists have arisen from harsh and inhospitable environments to thrive, create, and bring beauty and wonder to the world. The current exhibition (through June 15) features "Three Voices: Marita Dingus, Carletta Carrington Wilson, and Monad Graves Elohim." The latter artist will be present, play drums, and discuss his work at FORGE, a neighboring U of A incubator space with ample seating, at 4 pm.

Jim Ballinger, director emeritus of the Phoenix Art Museum, referred to Jim Waid as a "consummate artist." For those of you who have been in Tucson for any length of time at all, the name Jim Waid conjures up colorful canvases immersed in light, and instilled with energy and pure love of the Sonoran desert environment. The Waid downtown Tucson compound is covered with gardens of desert plants which, by April, should be in full bloom. Please note that you should wear comfy shoes.

An Oklahoma native, Jim received a BFA in painting from the University of New Mexico, followed by an MFA from the University of Arizona. He has taught at Pima Community College and U Arizona. His work is in the collections of the Tucson Museum of Art, University of Arizona Museum of Art, Phoenix Art Museum, Metropolitan Museum of Art, and Palm Springs Desert Museum, just to name a few. Jim received the Arizona Governor's Arts Award in the Individual Artist category in 2013 and was honored in 2017 by the Tucson Museum of Art with its first Lifetime Achievement Artist Award. Jim is represented by the Bentley Gallery, Phoenix, Etherton Gallery, Tucson, and William Havu Gallery, Denver.

Jim's son, Paul (right), inherited his father's artistic vision, and his work was recently featured in a oneperson exhibition at Tucson's Tohono Chul Gallery. We will visit Paul's studio also.

The CAS Board hopes you will join us for what will be a memorable afternoon with the Waids and also to learn about the 2024/25 CAS season.




