LAAP is constantly evolving at a time when museums worldwide are reinventing their best practices post pandemic. Change is difficult but we are trying to move forward with programming, collection support, funding and travel that complement the mission and strategic plan of the Tucson Museum of Art.

When I became a member, LAAP's focus was Mexican Folk Art. We have truly expanded our vision since then with support of exhibitions that include the entire range of Latin American Art from Ancient through Colonial, Contemporary and Latinx.

We also for the first time have purchased artworks for the permanent collection: a gold and silver Bolivian maté cup from the Vice-Regal period and a linocut print on found cardboard boxes by Latinx artist Narsiso Martinez whose work is the face of the exhibition *Ya Hecho: Readymade in the Borderlands* which opens this month.





We have learned from our membership that travel fundraisers are popular and we're excited to announce a trip to Oaxaca, one of Mexico's most popular destinations, in February 2025. Registration is now open to LAAP members and who better to lead this adventure than artists and LAAP Board Members, Stevie Mack and David Andres!

Save the date for our Thursday October 3rd opening reception and tour of the exhibition *South American Paintings* 1620 – 1820 from the Thoma Collection.

Dear LAAP Members,

Thank you being an integral part of our museum and helping ensure we continue to exhibit, interpret, and collect exceptional pieces of Latin American Art. I have enjoyed meeting LAAP members and appreciate all of those who have hosted events at their homes – I consider those special gatherings one of the highlights of my first 18 months here in Tucson.

I am looking forward to our upcoming season of exhibitions, educational offerings, community engagement initiatives, and much more.

In August, we will open two exhibitions featuring works from our collection, "Implied Narratives: Selections from the TMA Photography Collection" and "Paperwork: Selections from the Permanent Collection." In September, we open a special exhibition entitled "Paintings from Spanish America (1600 – 1800) from the Thoma Collection." Our "Arizona Biennial 2024" opens October 19 and will be on view through February 9, 2025. We received a record number of submissions – over 560!

Perhaps one of the most exciting "openings" this fall will be the reopening of La Casa Cordova. We will once again welcome visitors into this historic home, which houses El Nacimiento, during our Centennial Block Party on our November Second SundAZe. From that point forward, La Casa Cordova and beautiful courtyard will be open to museum visitors during regular museum hours of operation.

Our search for TMA's next Curator of Modern & Contemporary Art and Schmidt Curator of Latin American Art will begin soon. Both will be national searches with position openings posted on the American Association of Art Museum Curators, American Alliance of Museums, College Art Association, and New York Foundation for the Arts job boards, in addition to TMA's website, LinkedIn, and sent to museum leaders across the country. We are confident both positions will be filled before the end of this calendar year. Fortunately, we have scheduled exciting exhibitions well into 2025 and 2026.

Thank you for working with Christopher Gordon as your liaison until we welcome a new curator. And of course, thank you again for all you have done for our 100-year-old (young) institution!

# ON THE ROAD AGAIN: LAAP TRIP TO OAXACA, MEXICO

### February 15 - 23, 2025 Limited to 20 Travelers

Enjoy exclusive daily activities of studio and gallery tours, artist demonstrations, and visits to nearby cultural sites and museums. You'll receive a comprehensive tour booklet, expert guides at all sites and private van transportation to all tour sites and villages. This trip includes the work of both traditional and contemporary Oaxacan artists.

**Day 1: Arrival day** – Check into El Parador Monte Carmelo Hotel. Travelers can become familiar with the surrounding area and enjoy a meal at a local restaurant. Transportation from the airport to the hotel is provided.

Breakfast is served each day in the interior courtyard of El Parador Monte Carmeo Hotel.

Day 2: Walking Tour of Historic District – Visit the childhood home of President Benito Juarez and the Museo del Palacio Universum to view the mural by Arturo Garcia Bustos; see the Benito Juarez public market followed by Galeria Temenk to meet artist Manual Bernal, painter and printmaker. Stop at the Cultural Center San Pablo, the Textile Museum, the Contemporary Art Museum, and the Museo de los Pintores of Oaxaquenosca (MUPO), contemporary art galleries and folk art shops. After lunch, visit the home studio and gallery of the woodcarver Agustin Cruz Prudencio and his family in San Agustin de las Juntas. Agustin and his family members give a presentation and demonstration of their craft, detailing each aspect of production. The welcome dinner will be held at the beautiful Restaurant Catedral.

Sierna Angel, Oaxacan wood sculpture by Agustin Cruz Prudencio and Carmen Sosa Ojeda, was recently added to TMA's permanent collection. Day 3: Visit Teotitlan del Valle and Huayapam – Artisan Nelson Perez Mendoza and his family present visitors with an in-depth presentation of the carding, natural dying and weaving processes used in the production of rugs. Visit the studio of Fulgencio (Ful) Lazo in the village of Huayapam. In Oaxaca city, Nancy Mayagoitia, a former gallerist and collector, will make a presentation about the contemporary arts scene in Oaxaca.




Day 4: Walking Tour of Contemporary Art
Galleries/Studios in Historic District – Visit the
Manuel Bravo Photography Museum and see his
collection of art from ancient Mexico. Meet several
contemporary artists and view their works, including
photographer, Ceclia Salcedo, painter Raul Herrera
and the contemporary gallery owned by Manual
Garcia Dias near Templo de Santo Domingo de
Guzman. Visit the studio of Alejandro Martinez for a
demonstration about Grana Cochinilla and other art
techniques and the studio of Cecilio Sanchez who
works on amate paper with cochinilla, watercolor
and gold leaf.

Day 5: Visit Monte Alban and Santa Maria Atompa – View the remains of a great political and economic center of Zapotec civilization at the archaeological site of Monte Alban. Visit the village of Santa Maria Atzompa, home of the famous Teodora Blanco who originated a very ornate, decorative ceramic style that she called "embroidery." Award-winning ceramic artisan Enedina Vasquez will treat the group to a demonstration of her process. Travel to the nearby studio of contemporary painter, Jose (Eddie) Martinez.

Day 6: Visit Ocotlan and San Martin Tilcajete – Ocotlan is the home of the famous Oaxacan educator, painter, and philanthropist, Rudolfo Morales. His family home and gallery have undergone renovations in response to the 100 year anniversary of his birth (May 8, 1925). In the same town, visitors will enjoy the restored Exconvento Santo Domingo church and museum. In the same area is San Martin Tilcajete, another woodcarving village and the studio of the Fuentes family. A visit to their home allows you to see the family working together to produce their craft.

**Day 7: Visit San Augustin Etla –** Francisco Toledo's Cultural Center and the papermaking center, Taller Arte Papel, are in the village of San Augustin Etla and the home studio of artist and curator, Marieta Bernstorff and her husband Antonio Turok. Marietta lived in Tucson for several years and was a partner with the late Chicano photographer, Louis Carlos Bernal. Visit the home studio of painter Enrique Flores, for a demonstration of printmaking processes, and the home studio of ceramic sculptor Alan Pardes.

**Day 8: Visit San Bartolo Coyotepec** – Visit the home studio of Dra. Magdalena Martinez, one of the most outstanding and recognized Mexican ceramic artists in an area famous for the black pottery of Mexico. Visit the studios of painters Abelardo Lopez and Guillermo Pons, both famous landscape painters. Return to Oaxaca City for a visit to the art collection and Hacienda of Nancy Mayagoitia and enjoy a catered departure dinner.

**Day 9: Departure Day** – Time to pack up your memories and purchased treasures. Transportation from the hotel to the airport is provided.

### **Coming on October 3rd**

TMA will host the exhibition *Paintings from Spanish America* 1600-1800 from the Thoma *Collection* on September 23, 2024 through
January 2025. Paintings from Spanish America
features 16 works from the Thoma collection
from present-day Ecuador, Peru, Colombia,
Venezuela, Bolivia, and Cuba, dating from ca.
1600 to the late 18th century. The exhibition
includes oil paintings on canvas and delicately
rendered small works in oil on copper that
reveal the dynamic character of viceregal art,
a unique combination of styles influenced by
European artists important European
prototypes translated and adapted by local
hands.



TMA and LAAP will co-host a lecture for public engagement with the exhibition and there will be a reception on the Larkin patio exclusively for LAAP members.

Implied Narratives: Selections from the TMA Photography Collection

### **August 2024 - August 2025**

This exhibition features work from TMA's photography collection that present narratives left to the imagination. In photography, as much as in painting and works on paper, often an implied narrative exists where a plot is suggested through the images and composition presented. Audiences are left to ponder the scene or the image, not quite certain of where the "story" is going. It can be an exciting proposition. They have the freedom to invent a story based on their own histories, imagination, and knowledge.

Paperwork: Selections from the Permanent Collection

### **August 2024 - August 2025**

Paper is used every day, but only rarely is it closely observed with attention to its visual and tactile qualities. Paperwork looks to draw notice to paper, asking visitors to consider why artists choose specific paper types and how their selections contribute to the meaning and overall effect of an artwork. Drawing on the holdings of TMA's permanent collection, Paperwork considers works made with materials like rice paper, amate, cotton rag, newsprint, and auto body sandpaper.
