On January 18, 2025, there were 57 Western Art Patrons gathered to hear Jerry Freund give a very informative presentation entitled "The Gift of Spider Woman." The event was held at St. Phillip's in the Hills Episcopal Church with afternoon savories and sweets catered by Eclectic Café. The Navajos believe Spider Woman gave the Navajo women the gift of weaving. From about 1868 to 1880 the women wove blankets for men, women and children. Jerry's collection featured these wearing blankets.

Jerry had Robert Knight and Connie Trecartin modeled beautiful blankets from his collection. It felt like Jerry gave members a college course. The lecture lasted two hours but could have gone on for another hour. The patterns in Navajo blankets and rugs are balanced to represent balance in life of mind, body and spirit. A person needs a balanced life to walk in beauty in front, back, sides and all around. Jerry, thank you for giving a wonderful presentation.

Western Art Patrons Attend Settler's West American Miniatures Preview

The annual Miniatures Show at Settlers West Galleries was a good time to get together and socialize and preview the show for many Western Art Patrons on February 6, 2025. This event was in conjunction with the Foothills Art District "First Thursday." Landscapes, people, animals and still lifes were the subjects of small original paintings and sculptures by more than 160 artists. Thirty WAP members enjoyed this beautiful art as well as refreshments and conversations. Some of our members placed bids on the art. Were they selected? <u>WAP Tour of Divergence of Legacy:</u> Art of the American West in the 21st Century.

Twenty-six members of Western Art Patrons joined TMA's Glasser Senior Curator, Christine Brindza, for an in-depth tour of Tucson Museum of Art's newest exhibition, *Divergence of Legacy: Art of the American West in the 21st Century.*

Divergence of Legacy is a new look of what defines "The Art of the West." Working with community curators, the exhibit honors traditional Western Art and gives us a look at new interpretations of the West. Curation with members of the community is a new concept for museums and the Tucson Museum of Art is on the forefront of this practice, receiving accolades from other museums.

By listening to Senior Curator Christine Brindza we were able to understand connections between the art and hear stories that highlight the exhibition. The themes explained and expanded our ideas about the people, history, and cultures of the region. Especially interesting was the wall that shows paintings that feature Tucson, from the very oldest of the old to more contemporary, including *The Convento Ruins, Tucson, Arizona* by Alfred Lambourne, 1880, to *Boboquivari* by Lone Wolf, 1919, to *Tucson Low Rider*, 1983 by Vivian Mallette Hutchins, and to a painting honoring Tucson's dark skies, *Tucson from Mt. Lemmon Highway*, 1990 by Deann Melton.

Several members mentioned how much they enjoyed the tour because they never would have learned as much from wandering through the exhibition on their own. A guided tour really emphasizes the connections between art and how they relate to one another. WOW! It was amazing to learn and understand what our curator does and all the thought and preparation that goes into hanging an exhibition.

For the second part of the tour the group headed to the lower level of the museum to see the Hamilton Gallery of Art of the West and the Indigenous gallery. Hamilton Gallery of the American West was

toured with long time docents and WAP members Katherine Scoggin-Sobonya and Linda Friedman. Katherine led the way with her rip-roaring western music as we headed down the ramp. Katherine and half of the group toured the Western Gallery and Linda toured the Indigenous Gallery.

We were so pleased to welcome six new WAP members to our group. Members were actively engaged in looking at the art and left with a new appreciation of *Divergence and Legacy*, as well as the collection galleries.

Be sure to visit the galleries, we think you, too, will be really impressed! From the old to the new, from

Indigenous art to cowboys and cowgirls to landscapes to pottery and folk art this exhibition has something for everyone.

WAP Annual Meeting with Julia Arriola

he WAP Annual Meeting was held on Monday, April 28, 2025 at the Baker Center, Tucson Museum

of Art. Forty-eight members attended the meeting and 36 stayed for the optional dinner. WAP President, Nancy Landes, welcomed Christoper Gordon, TMA's Interim Director and CEO/CFO/COO. Chris started by thanking all the members for their support for underwriting and acquisitions, especially for being the presenting sponsor for *Divergence of Legacy: Art of the American West of the 21st Century*. Chris outlined upcoming exhibits for 2025-2026. Chris also shared that the Board of Trustees had approved the hiring of a new Director & CEO, Anne Breckenridge Barrett.

During the President's Comments, Nancy Landes shared a brief overview of the past year and thanked

the WAP Board and Travel & Events committee for their hard work organizing the 2024/2025 events. Nancy also congratulated Christine for successfully defending her dissertation and earning her PhD. WAP has 133 members and 86 memberships. Nancy encouraged all in attendance to renew their WAP membership in June for the coming year and to consider the top Patron and Benefactor levels.

Nancy called for approval of the 2024 Annual Meeting Minutes, which were unanimously approved.

She then introduced Christine Brindza, Senior Curator, Art of the American West. Christine reviewed the past year's work, including the publication of *Community-Based Curation: A Toolkit for Expanding Narratives and Changing Practices*, and the latest project involving eight community curators to develop the *Divergence of Legacy: Art of the American West of the 21st Century*. Christine and Marianna Pegno received the Impact Award from the American Alliance of Museums for the Toolkit for Community Curation, and Christine and Marianna won the Impact Award for the Western Museums Association Conference. Congratulations on these well-deserved awards!

Jim Betty, Treasurer, covered the financials which included WAP's commitment of \$20,000 for the upcoming year beginning July 1, 2025, with \$10,000 going to underwrite the *Arizona Biennial* and \$5,000 each to refresh the Hamilton Gallery and the Indigenous Arts Gallery.

Connie Trecartin, chair of Travel & Events, shared the 2025-2026 season events, which kicks off with the trip to the Coeur d'Alene Art Auction in Reno, NV, July 23 - 27. The WAP opening event is scheduled for Oct. 26, 2025, at the Baker Education Center, with Christine Brindza as our presenting speaker. Many more fun and educational events are planned for the 2025- 2026 season, which you can find later in this newsletter.

Following the reports, Nancy called for a motion to approve new board member, Mark Friefeld. Mark was approved and the Board convened to vote on the new slate of officers.

The formal meeting was adjourned so that we could enjoy the special guest speaker, Julia Arriola. Christine introduced Julia Arriola, a Mescalero Apache / Mayo multi-talented artist. Julia discussed her initial training as a sculptor and spoke of her long-time friendship with TMA.

She gifted *We Need to Give a Damn: She Lived, She Inspired,* multimedia sculpture, and *Remember Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls,* colored pencil on a copy of a 1796 print map of the Americas. She served on TMA's Collections Committee and was a Community Curator for two projects. Julia now lives in Albuquerque NM. She considers herself a storyteller and fell in love with ledger art because of its history as a way of preserving Indigenous cultures when old ledger paper was the only material available during the Reservation period. Therefore, ledger art makes her sad, but she is also glad to carry on this rich tradition.

Julia explained how she became interested in steampunk and joined the Tucson Steampunk Society. She loves the 19th century and likes to mix up the themes with gears and coyotes, plus the Rez Dogs are usually drummers. Her first ledger drawing was a response to John Gast's 1872 painting *American Progress* (aka Manifest Destiny) depicting the Hopi Maiden bringing blessings, rain and corn. Julia also loves carousel horses and has done several ledger paintings of them. Her dad was Mescalero Apache and she always thought of him as a Koshare. Julia's ledger work has been an incredible journey for her. She didn't think she'd be able to see any of it, but the journey is still unfolding.

Curator's Corner

As I reflect on this past year, it has been a whirlwind. Being the solo curator at TMA has been the

most challenging and rewarding of my professional career. With all this, I also finished my dissertation, and on May 18, I attended my convocation and was officially hooded as a Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Arizona.
